

West, Texas Fertilizer Plant Response

- April 17th, 2013
- West Fertilizer Co. caught fire
- Ammonium nitrate
- Cause is still unknown

- Approximately \$57 million in damages
- Homes, nursing home, high school and middle school damaged
- App. 200 treated for injuries
- 15 deaths






Texas Animal Health Commission Response to West

- TAHC was deployed to West via request for support with animal issues through the Disaster District Committee
- Integrated into Incident Command Post to assist local animal personnel with coordination of animal issues
 - TAHC personnel:
 - conducted animal needs assessments
 - assisted in relocation of livestock
 - assisted with carcass disposal
 - Other affected premises were sheltered in place






- Continue to quickly integrate into ICS, ensure local animal responders are included
- Continue to improve and implement communication protocols between response partners

- Continue to refine decision making as to what resources should be deployed






- Continue to train personnel in all-hazard events
